THESE ARE UPDATED THOUGHTS THAT WILL HELP YOU TO SEPARATE FACT FROM FICTION....

Two current commissioners (Brost and Berleth) are running with another candidate (Folsom) in an attempt to take over the ESD 11 board. There are five members, so 3 is a majority. Among these candidates is incumbent Robert Berleth, who on more than one occasion has threatened to replace Cypress Creek EMS with a private ambulance contractor.

Quite frankly, the company in question has hired a lot of medics that Cypress Creek rejected. They would lack the ability to continue CCEMS' heart attack and stroke protocols that have saved hundreds of lives.
Right now, one of our paramedics can call any hospital in our region and ask to bypass the Emergency Room and go straight to a heart cath lab. CCEMS can spot the signs of a serious heart artery blockage on an EKG. This first-in-the-nation program was developed by Cypress Creek EMS and it took quite a while to get all of the hospitals on board. Our medics have a 98% success rate in reading the signs on an EKG and actually went up to 99% in March.

Cypress Creek EMS was the first in the nation to use the Lucas device which automates CPR compressions freeing up medics hands to perform other tasks on the patient. This too has increased heart attack survival.
CCEMS also carries monitors to read carbon monoxide blood levels in smoke inhalation cases and Carbon Monoxide poisoning. We carry an expensive drug that acts as an antidote to that poisoning and saves lives.
We will soon be the first EMS in the state to carry whole blood products, while our education center teaches police officers and firefighters how to stop arterial bleeding with the proper use of modern tourniquets. We teach every police cadet class at U of H. Arterial bleeds can kill in as little as 3 minutes, so it's imperative that the first person to reach an accident, shooting or stabbing scene to know what to do. We will be adding this training to our civilian education program in the near future.

The CCEMS Communications Center handles 9-1-1 and dispatch for 16 emergency agencies, including the volunteer fire departments in our area. 13 of the agencies for which we handle dispatch were affected by the recent floods. CCEMS dispatchers took the calls for high water rescues and dispatched the fire department rescue teams. One commissioner, Kevin Brost, actually threatened the fire departments for which we handle dispatch saying that the ESD could pull funding from the Comm Center.

Many of the rescues in the recent flooding that firefighters and our medics responded to involved senior citizens. At least two nursing homes and an assisted living facility were flooded and called for help.
A lot of wild and untrue accusations have been made by these two incumbent commissioners along with their partner in crime, Wayne Dolcefino. CCEMS set the record straight in a couple of recent posts. This includes the fact that Robert Berleth missed 79% of the ESD meeting in 2015. He claims to have high EMS standards but was fired from Cy-Fair for sexual harassment, leaving lifesaving equipment
